Puebla artist Alfonso Castillo Orta (1944–2009) created this colorful *Árbol de la Vida* (Tree of Life) candelabra, which features *Día de los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) skeletal figures, including a *Catrina*, as well as bird and floral elements. Orta was best known for his elaborate candelabras, which were formed by hand and painted using natural pigments. Today, Orta's family continues to produce work in the style that he created.
